Festival promises to be 'good show'

Former SAS soldier and Survive Aotearoa frontman Chris Kumeroa is aiming for something bigger and better in this year's Whanganui River Valley Hunting Competition and Wild Food Festival.

It's from April 29 to May 1 and he's targeting parties of celebrity hunters and is confident it will be filmed for both mainstream and Maori audiences. He wants to show people a really good time.

"Celebrity teams will be making their way from every part of the country. We want them all to have an amazing time and spread the word."

Mr Kumeroa has ties to Ngati Tuera and Ngati Hinearo on the Whanganui River.

He was in the SAS in the New Zealand Defence Force and now runs an international security business from Auckland as well as being on Nga Tangata Tiaki, the new Whanganui iwi governance entity.

This year's will not be the first hunting competition held at a Whanganui River marae. The last was at Matahiwi in March 2014 and the next is planned for Jerusalem in 2017.

Mr Kumeroa would like to move it farther afield and bring in Otoko and Uenuku.

'We want to spread the love all the way up to Taumarunui."

Hunters pay a registration fee that becomes part of the prize money.

They start the weekend with a powhiri at 10am at Parikino Marae on the Friday.

At noon the groups and individuals take off into the hills on horseback, foot, helicopter, jetboat or four-wheel drive vehicle.

The sponsors will be allocated hunting blocks for their exclusive use, with a guide and other help.

One of the best will be Papahaua, an Atihau Whanganui Incorporation block of

The animals hunted will be fallow deer, red deer, pigs, goats, possums, magpies and rabbits.

Mr Kumeroa saw about six last time he was there, and they were "decent sized" animals.

On Sunday hunters have to be back at Parikino for the weigh-in between noon and 2pm, and prizegiving from 3pm-5pm. The top prize will be \$1000, and there will be others of clothing and GPS gear.

That's also the food festival day, with entertainment and games for non-hunters, families and friends. Entry will cost \$5 for adults, with children under 16

There will be food stalls, with stallholders paying a fee that goes towards marae funds. Ned

Tapa is to run some fun on the water — a tug of war with paddlers in the same waka paddling in opposite directions.

Any animals the hunters don't want to take home will be

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auctioned, with the money going to the marae.

Mr Kumeroa is enlisting lots of help for the event.

Hunting guide Lee Winterburn will provide advice, and there will be medical and safety personnel. Department of Conservation staff will be on hand, and pleased with the cull

of pest animals.

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One of the goals of the event is to bring river people back to their marae and revive the practice of hunting and making traditional kai.

Another aim is to raise money for river marae, and lure people back to them.

"Lots of Maori now live in

urban areas. We would like to reverse some of that, and get them back to the marae.
