Matua coming to hunting festival

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Former All Black and Hunting Aotearoa presenter Matua Parkinson will be the star at this weekend's Whanganui River Valley Hunting Competition and Wild Food Festival.

The festival is at Parikino Marae. It starts with a powhiri for hunters on Friday morning and ends with a prizegiving late on Sunday afternoon.

Hunters' entries closed on Friday, but organiser Chris Kumeroa expected there would be some late ones. Hunters will be in teams of four, and there may be as many as 50 teams. Each will be allotted a hunting block in the wider area.

The prize Papahaua hunting block will probably go to Ken Williams, a sponsor and owner of Wanganui Holden. Paetawa should be another good block — goats are being shot and left there, to draw out the

Mr Kumeroa hasn't been able to get the festival filmed for television, but he said *The Hunters Club* had committed to coming to the Whanganui River at a later stage. He's hoping it can film celebrity teams hunting here and lure some of Auckland's hunters into the area.

"It will be great for tourism, and put

more money in the economy."

There are some unique features of backblocks Whanganui hunting, he said.

We have large groups of fallow and red deer, not crossed over or matched up with any other species. They're good, free

range hunting animals."

Prizes for this weekend's winning hunters will include \$4000 worth of Ridgeline clothing, a GPS and two rifles.

On Saturday there's a first for the river, the Whakatupato firearm safety programme will be run at Parikino Marae by firearms safety specialist Nicole McKee, with Vinnie Heihei from Whanganui Police. There are 14 people registered, and they should all be able to end the day with firearms licences.

Mr Kumeroa would like to run the programme the length of the river, from the mouth to Taumarunui.

morning. They will be open from 10am on, with a charge of \$5 for adults.

On the food festival side there will be coming from Palmerston North and agencies such as the Conservation Department and Nga Tangata Tiaki will have information stalls.

The hunters return from midday onward. The excitement will build from there, as stories are told and animals appraised.

Carcasses will be weighed, and deer heads and pigs' jaws assessed. There will be prizes for large and average pigs and fallow and red deer. Children will present their possums, rabbits and magpies.

Prizegiving begins about 4pm, with bands Cool Meditation and the Clazzmatic Boogie Orchestra there to

Money raised will go to Parikino Marae. Mr Kumeroa plans to hold the festival weekend at Jerusalem next year, and other marae after that.

Now retired from Parliament, Dame Tariana said on Friday she was happy to be out of mainstream politics and was enjoying life "on the outside", working on a number of projects, mainly around health issues.
